

But it wasn't always the case. When these photos were taken by Garth Dawson, women driving buses and cabs was considered newsworthy. This was 1979, four years after the Sex Discrimination Act, and a year before women could apply for a bank loan without their husbands' approval. If you can identify these drivers by the way, we want to hear from you!

Women's Work, a Hyndburn Heritage Lottery Funded project, highlights local women's workplace experiences in the early days of equality. Run by History In Action CIC, their voices are brought to life through community performance and school workshops. Already 20 women have come forward and their recorded interviews will be available on a local heritage website and embedded into a talking chair to be installed at Accrington Library.

Be Kind – Stay Safe



Hello everyone and greetings from Cardiff.

I'm a long way from home as I write this: filming a BBC six part drama, The Pact, until mid-December. I am one of the very fortunate people in my industry who are working right now, in these most uncertain of times. We were supposed to start on the job at the beginning of lockdown and we've managed over a month so far, with a dedicated Covid supervisor (an awardwinning playwright in her other life, but known as "Covid Jen" on set, poor thing),

regular testing, daily temperature checks and masks on all the time, even in rehearsals, up until the actual take. Sometimes at a distance you catch a glimpse of a crew member's unmasked face as they eat their lunch and it's always a surprise. You find yourself imagining the bottom half of people's faces, and the reality is often very different ("Ooh I did NOT imagine that nose below those eyes" etc).

It has been a whole new world and a not unchallenging one, but we're a good five weeks in and no one has tested positive yet, so something is working. We will continue to film, in spite of the Welsh lockdown, because we're classed as Covid-safe. And of course, we can't work from home. My family were due to come and visit during half term but we've cancelled the trip naturally. We all have to do the right thing as much as we're able, and however inconvenient and upsetting.

I feel that people are really struggling at the moment. The second wave, the worsening weather, the increased restrictions, the confusion, the end of furloughing. And of course for those who are, and have been, shielding throughout, it must be particularly stressful. I might be wrong but I feel we've lost a little bit of the incredible community spirit that emerged from the first lockdown and which I wrote about in my last column for Acorn News. As the rules relaxed, and some of us drifted back to work and to school and to the pub, we could on occasion kid ourselves that there was a bit of normality returning. Please let's try to continue to check in with our elderly and vulnerable friends, family and neighbours.

Restrictions will inevitably cause some loneliness and isolation, and that little check-in phone call or casserole on the doorstep could really make a difference, especially as the nights draw in and the festive season approaches. Christmas can be such a difficult time for so many, bombarded as we are by images of fun and togetherness in the lead up. And this Christmas, many families look set to be unable to celebrate together.

Looking after our Mental Health, as well as keeping physically well, has never been more important. If you're struggling, please don't suffer in silence. There are many organisations, who are there for you; who are dedicated to providing support and a friendly ear for anyone who feels lonely or sad, or worse. I have listed some at the end of this article.

There are also lots of online resources providing help and advice on how to look after our mental and physical wellbeing in these anxious times. A good general guide is the Five-a-Day for Mental Health:

- 1. Stay active: according to your ability, of course. From going for a run, to getting out down the avenue on your new walker (mum!), from a full online yoga session to some gentle stretches and deep breathing in your armchair. When you feel down, you don't often feel like it, but it really, really helps. Chemical things happen in your brain! On really rainy days I've taken to putting on some old favourite tunes and dancing round my kitchen, like I'm at the Larde-dars in 1985!
- 2. Learn something: there are so many great podcasts, audiobooks, streaming documentaries out there. Pick a subject and enter a world you knew nothing about before. I've enrolled on an online British Sign Language course this year and am struggling through my level 1 at the moment. The time absolutely flies by when I'm deep in concentration trying to memorise the signs, and, I'm loving it. It has given me a real sense of achievement. You don't need to enrol or anything, you can learn so much from YouTube these days. From DIY, to how to play guitar, to languages.

- 3. Connect: make that call, send that email, write a letter! Again, sometimes you can end up feeling so out of sorts that you can't be bothered, but we're humans, and we need other humans as much as we need food and water. And you might make someone's day. Ask someone how they are and really listen to their answer. Letting someone talk about their feelings is one of the greatest gifts you can give. But equally, don't be afraid to reach out and tell someone if you're struggling. It's okay not to be okay.
- 4. Put something back: is there something you can do for someone else? Ask a neighbour if they need anything when you go to the shops? Plant a few spring bulbs somewhere for passers-by to enjoy? Make a cake for a friend? Write a letter to your MP about something that you think could be better in your community? Make a little donation to a cause?

I help run an organisation called 500 Acts of Kindness. Every week 500+ people (it's more like 1000 now) donate a pound by standing order, and any contributor is free to nominate a person, family, group or organisation in need to receive £500 from us, no questions asked. We have been going for two years now and have given over £30,000. The breadth of those we've helped is astonishing. For example this week we contributed to an electric wheelchair for a little boy with muscular dystrophy; bought a new laptop for an exprisoner who discovered writing in prison and who was changing his life in amazing ways before his computer was stolen; donated to a group supporting refugees; and provided a tumble dryer for a man bringing up 3 children alone in a two bedroom flat. Every week our regular contributors tell us how much joy the weekly update gives them: knowing that their £1 is doing such huge things, changing people's lives and allowing people to breathe a little easier. All for less than the price of a cup of coffee. All of us feel we get more than we give being part of this group. It feels like a little beacon of hope in these dark times.

5. Be in the moment: it's all we have right now. Who knows what will happen in the coming days and weeks? Who knows where we'll be at by Christmas? Try not to worry about the future, but focus on right here and now, with your full attention. Look out of your window; notice the changes taking place in the natural world as autumn turns to winter. Take some big deep breaths and ground yourself, just for a minute, especially when you feel yourself spiralling off. And remember, it's okay to feel whatever you're feeling. Be kind to yourself. Try and do something you enjoy. Put on that album you've not listened to in ages, watch an old favourite film; plant some seeds. But just be here now. One day at a time.

Sending lots of love and warmest wishes to you all. Stay safe and look after yourselves and each other.

Prepare your home for Christmas

If you are thinking of any house improvements before Christmas, don't leave it too long. There is always a rush on services at this time of year so whether it's a new carpet you fancy, a new bathroom or kitchen or simply a new fire fitting, you should be aware that if you don't put your plans into action, you might not get it in time.

The same applies with furniture and large electrical goods that require delivery and installation. Take our tip and act fast. By the time you are reading this it is already November and less than two months from Christmas.

Here are a few tips courtesy of the Daily Mirror to help you plan a great Christmas:

1. Light it up! - It's the darkest time of the year so make your home sparkle with some clever lighting. Everyone loves fairylights on the tree but adding them to your mantelpiece or wrapping them around your stair banisters creates a festive glow that can flow from room to room. Drape them across the tops of shelves or even above cornicing for a gorgeous glow.

2. Tree to the max - If you're bored of just a large Christmas tree stuck in one corner every year, why not think about getting a few smaller trees to dot around the house? Artificial, smaller trees are great for adding festive cheer to other areas of your home such as the hallway, upstairs landing and even your bedroom!

3. Use your little kelpers - Get the kids involved in making home-made decorations such as wreaths and fireside ornaments. Wreaths - simply twist a wire coat-hanger into a round base for the wreath, then wrap branches of greenery around them such as pine and fir, securing with wire. You can then glue in fir cones or plastic red berries. Kids will love decorating their own fir cones. Simply bring a few back from a muddy walk, clean up and spray with gold or silver glitter spray and dot around your fireplace or under the tree.

4. Take it - Nothing says Christmas like candles. But, with kids and tipsy relations milling about they can be dangerous. Invest in some flameless battery-operated flicker candles. Many have scents like the real thing. Pop them in your window to give a festive glow – without the worry of any accidents.

5. Santa stop kere! - Make sure Santa doesn't miss your house by using fun signs and placards. A 'Santa stop here' sign looks great outside the house or by the chimney – and it's a good way to bribe the kids into behaving well by reminding them Father Christmas is on his way.

6. Change the colour - Everyone associates Christmas with colours such as red and gold. But why do the same? A tree covered with different shades of blue baubles and decorations, for example, gives a modern edge – you can complement this with blue accents in your garlands and even hang up different coloured blue stockings by the fire.

7. Pick a theme - Perhaps you're tired of your usual decorations so why not pick a theme this year? Victorian Christmas decorations look stunning in any home – think Mistletoe balls hanging from ribbon, and small toys, dried fruits and nuts hanging from the tree for a truly historical Christmas.

8. Dine in style - It's the most important meal of the year. So don't let your table decorations let the turkey down. A selection of different coloured and sized baubles in a clear vase make a great quirky centrepiece. Handmade placecards cut into shapes like Christmas trees or sprigs of holly will make your guests feel extra special.

9. Show your cards - Bored of simply stuffing your cards in the windowsill, only to knock them down every time you pull the curtains? Why not choose a more inventive way to display them. Cards hanging from strips of ribbon at different heights makes a pretty display, or why not peg cards around a wreath on the wall? Another way is to hang an empty picture frame with string in lines inside it – hang your cards from the strings to create a 'painting' of cards on your wall.

10. Don't forget outdoors - If you want more than just a few lights hanging from the exterior of your house, why not invest in some freestanding rope lights in festive shapes such as reindeers and Santa to give a festive edge to your front lawn? Or, instead of the usual wreath on your front door, get one with LED lights that will glow in the darkness, welcoming your guests to the perfect Christmas... *Peter Jones 2018*





Traditional Mince Pie Recipe

This crumbly, fruity mince pie recipe is a Christmas classic. Serve warm with lashings of brandy butter.

Ingredients

350g/12oz high quality mincemeat, preferably homemade

200g/7oz plain flour, sifted 40g/11/20z golden caster sugar 75g/2¾ oz ground almonds 125g/41/20z unsalted butter, diced 1 large free-range egg, beaten Milk, to glaze



Method

- 1. Lightly butter a 12-hole pie or patty tin. Tip the mincemeat into a bowl and stir so that the liquid is evenly distributed.
- 2. Place the flour, sugar, almonds and butter in a food processor and process briefly until resembling breadcrumbs, then slowly add the egg through the feeder tube. (Or rub the butter into the dry ingredients by hand and stir in the egg.)
- 3. Bring the mixture together with your hands, wrap in cling film and chill for an hour or so. Thinly roll out the pastry on a floured surface. Cut out 12 circles wit a fluted pastry cutter, large enough to fill the base of the prepared tin. Press gently into each hole, then fill with the mincemeat.
- 4. Cut out another 12 slightly smaller discs and use to cover the mincemeat. Press the edges together to seal. Make a small slit in the top of each, then brush lightly with milk. Chill for about 30 minutes. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 200°C/400F/Gas 6.
- 5. Bake the pies for 20 minutes until golden brown. Remove to a wire rack and serve warm

Top Recipe Tip - Cut our star shapes for the pastry lid or create a snowflake pattern, using a festive doily as a template and sprinkle with icing sugar.

Mulled Wine

The Gordon Shelter by Ellison Street

Ever since the advent of public transport in Accrington, the focal point for boarding and alighting steam trams, electric cars and buses had been on Peel Street. The Market Hall was opened on October 23rd 1869 and an 'outside or open' market occupied an area on the Peel Street side of the main building. With no shelters provided for tram passengers during bad weather, they used to congregate under the

canvass canopies of the stalls. This was not a problem on the non-market days, but it gave great annoyance to market traders and stall holders when potential customers could not get to the stalls for people sheltering, who when asked to move on, then crowded into the entrance of the Market Hall itself. This problem had obviously come to the attention of Thomas Gordon JP, a resident of Mount Cottage on Whalley Road, who was a successful businessman in Accrington.

Born in Burnley, Thomas Gordon worked for a time at the Howard & Bullough Factory in Accrington, before becoming a Director of Lang Bridge Engineering.

He was a devoted Baptist lay preacher and amongst his other interests, a benefactor of Accrington Victoria Hospital. On retiring in November 1919, he wished to leave the town a gift that would be of some lasting use. So the town council received correspondence from him, offering a donation of £230 in two instalments of £150 and £80, towards the erection of a tramway shelter and waiting room on Peel Street near the Market entrance. This was quite a considerable amount of money then, so it was resolved to offer the council's cordial thanks to Mr Gordon for this gift.

The Glasgow firm of Walter McFarland & Co. were asked to construct a building with a cast iron frame at their Saracen Foundry. In May 1920, the town council met when the Mayor announced they were in receipt of a further cheque for £400 from Mr Gordon, which was the balance of the cost of erecting the tramway shelter. It was resolved to approve the Borough Surveyor's plan to have it erected directly in line with the central doors on the Peel Street side of the Market Hall. The Market Superintendent was authorised to serve notice on the tenants whose stalls would be displaced and to do his best to find these stall-holders alternative accommodation. At its official opening during the autumn of 1920, Thomas Gordon, its patron said "He hoped that it would be of value to the general public". The structure itself was divided into two equal parts by a central passage, each furnished with wooden slatted benches. Not long after opening four destination boards were put up, two each side of the exits, to encourage the formation of orderly queues. The finishing touch came in the form of a clock, which was suspended from the ceiling.

The Gordon Shelter was much appreciated by passengers, but after withdrawal of the trams in 1932 and the subsequent dispersal of bus stops, the shelter began to lose its importance. In September 1936 the Town Clerk reported he had been in discussions with a representative of the British Automatic Company Ltd, with regard to the drop in revenue from their machines where parcels were weighed before transit. He stated that with the approval of the Company, he had agreed to an increase of charges from £3 to £4 with respect to the machine situated in the Gordon Shelter.

By January 1938, it was resolved that this (now) bus shelter on Peel Street, would not be incorporated into any new bus station scheme. It was decided the question of its future use should be deferred to the Transport Committee for consideration, following consultations with the representatives of the donor.

The plan to convert part of it to a transport office, first mooted in July 1949, had been shelved as it was never intended to be annexed by the Transport Department, even though facilities for the supervision of buses were far from satisfactory. However, it was stated that the Gordon Shelter had now become the regular meeting place for an old folk's club. In September, the town council met and a resolution was passed to allow a part of the shelter to be requisitioned as a bus inspector's office. There was vociferous opposition from Mr Tetlow, whilst Alderman Johnson enquired as to whether there were any legally binding conditions attached to this bequest. The Town Clerk replied that following extensive investigations no trace of any agreement had been discovered, but from the correspondence on this matter, it



became obvious that Thomas Gordon had specifically intended it to be for the exclusive use of the general public. Councillor Barnes urged the adoption of a proposal for the change of use on two counts. The first was that this shelter was so to speak, "on the right spot", which was where the majority of the bus services started from. Secondly, there were now other shelters available to the public whereas before there had been none. The minutes for the change of use were passed by 16 votes to 7.

In June 1953 the General Manager of the Transport Department, Harry Eaton, sought the instructions of the Committee

with regard to the future of the shelter. The council proposed to remove the structure, a decision which caused a furore with the public and in the press. In a compromise move the Transport Committee offered to retain the structure, so long as half could be occupied by the Corporation Transport Department as an inspector's office, but a vociferous opposition would not shift from their stance. In August, at a meeting of the General Purposes Committee it was ultimately resolved to have arrangements made for it to be demolished.

In February 1954, workmen moved in and demolition began. In March, George Walker criticised the council's Planning Committee "For not providing alternative accommodation before taking it down, and treating the elderly with great contempt." Replying for the committee, Councillor Mrs Ridehalgh said, "It was out of concern for the old folk that they had searched for a more convenient site". Mr Walker said, "He hoped that this was a priority". However, following an enquiry into the County Council's plans to demolish property in the Infant Street, Davy Street, Bridge Street and Bank Street areas for the establishment of a dedicated bus station, this was now abandoned. So this piece of iconic town centre infrastructure a well-loved Accrington landmark was gone for ever.

Thomas Gordon passed away in St Annes-on-Sea at the age of 85. He had also been a director of the North Pier in Blackpool.

Why do I need a will?

By making a will, you can ensure, that on your death your wishes are carried out regarding the distribution of your assets. If you die without a Will, legal rules govern the distribution of your assets and who will be in charge of the distribution.

A Will is also an opportunity to put in place tax or care fee planning measures.

I don't need a will because my spouse / partner get everything anyway?

Not necessarily. Married spouses do inherit a part of your estate but in some cases not 100%. In the case of unmarried couples, the notion of common law marriage doesn't actually exist so there is no automatic entitlement for that partner regardless of how long you've been together or whether you have children together. A Will is the only way to ensure that your assets pass to your chosen beneficiaries.

What is inheritance tax?

In general terms, the government sets a threshold (the 'Nil Rate Band'). Any amount above this threshold is taxable at 40%. A Will is an opportunity to consider this position and

put in place appropriate planning to avoid this tax.

Why should a solicitor draft my Will? The language of Wills can be confusing as it is formed on historical precedents.

Whilst Wills can be bought "off the shelf" the wording used in Wills is extremely particular and in some instances a homemade Will could be found to be invalid, or fail to distribute your assets correctly. This can lead to family disputes and in some cases lengthy court proceedings.

There are many companies who offer Will writing services, but most are not professionally qualified and not regulated. WHN as Solicitors, belong to a regulated profession and are insured in the rare case of something going wrong. Solicitors can also hold the original or a copy of a Will, ensuring that it can be safely kept and easily located.

What is involved in making a Will?

As a general overview, as part of the process in making a Will you should consider: Executors

executors

These people will ensure that your wishes are carried out.

Specific Wishes

You can include funeral wishes, including a desire to donate your body to medical science, this can be included in the Will.

Who you would like to act as guardians for any infant children so that they will make decisions regarding their upbringing, education and general welfare.

Whether there are any specific gifts (such as household items) or cash legacies you wish to leave to specific friends, family members or charities.

Your Property and Assets

What happens to any land or property you own?

You should finally consider want you wish to happen with everything else you own (le: your savings / bank accounts).

It is always sensible to consider who would benefit from a particular asset should one of your chosen beneficiaries die before you. As an example you can make provision that their share will pass to someone else or for example their family or children.
